LOS ALAMOS: "Dust, Drought, and Dreams Gone Dry" January & February 2015



For six weeks in January and February the Mesa Public Library in Los Alamos will host a traveling exhibit about the epic drought that devastated the Great Plains in the 1930s. Mesa Library is one of only 25 libraries nationwide chosen by the American Library Association to host the exhibit. Letters, oral histories, photos, maps, and individual voices tell the story of the human and environmental impact of extreme weather, agricultural disaster, and economic devastation during the Dust Bowl. An emphasis of the exhibit is on women's voices and their eloquence about their experiences in the Dust Bowl.

Our Los Alamos AAUW branch has offered to facilitate community discussions of Timothy Egan's awardwinning history of the Dust Bowl, *The Worst Hard Time*. Other activities will include a talk on climate change by LANL scientist Nate McDowell and two showings of Ken Burns' film *The Dust Bowl*.

We extend an invitation to all AAUW members to come see this informative exhibit on a very timely topic—drought and climate change—and learn more about the great American Dust Bowl. We also invite you to read Egan's telling chronicle of those who survived the disaster and join us in discussing its lessons for today. Key exhibit events are as follows:

The Santa Fe Fall 2014 <u>Expanding Your Horizons</u> STEM-C Conference was held on Saturday November 8, 2014 at the Santa Fe Community College, presented by NM Network of Women in Science & Engineering (NMNWSE) and AAUW-Santa Fe.

The mission of Expanding Your Horizons (EYH) is to encourage young women to pursue science, technology, engineering and mathematics – computer science (STEM-C) careers. Through EYH programs, we provide STEM role models and hands-on activities for $5^{th} - 8^{th}$ grade girls. Our ultimate goal is to motivate girls to become innovative and creative thinkers ready to meet 21st Century challenges.

142 girls participated in the conference and represented 37 different public, charter, and private schools from all over Santa Fe and surrounding communities (Pojoaque, Los Alamos, and Albuquerque). The girls seem to enjoy the conference as indicated by their responses to the open-ended questions and the conference evaluation questions, using adjectives like: **inspiring, awesome, fun, wonderful,** and **intriguing**.

The EYH conference was successful with keynote speaker Jen Martinez, a Los Alamos National Lab staff scientist, and 10 one-hour-long STEM workshops taking place concurrently plus an adult workshop presented by ¡Explora! Staff.

As in previous years, the overwhelming number of volunteers at this event was integral to its success. 61 adult volunteers participated in this conference. Special thanks to our own AAUW member Shelley Rossbach, who was on the steering committee.
