The Santa Fe Concert Band is the oldest musical group in Santa Fe, continuing one of Santa Fe's oldest traditions of free public concerts by volunteer musicians. It traces its roots to Francisco Perez, a bugler, who served with General Henry Hopkins Sibley and the Texas Brigade. After the Civil War, Perez came back to Santa Fe with a small group of musicians later known as *La Banda de Santa Fe* and performed plaza concerts for over 20 years. His band was the first civic band in Santa Fe.

The Santa Fe Concert Band was formally incorporated in 1983 under the direction of Greg Heltman, who continues as director. It is an all-volunteer organization and open to musicians of all levels.

The full report for our Fall 2015 Santa Fe Expanding your Horizons conference, is out and available on our branch website under "STEM". OPPORTUNITY SANTA FE SUMMIT

On Wednesday, On Wednesday, November 18, multiple city agencies and community organizations in Santa Fe sponsored a day long summit, "Expanding Opportunities for Santa Fe's Children & Youth from Birth to Career. "Speakers and panels discussed ongoing Santa Fe programs whose goals are to expand and improve the many tiered educational

opportunities and outcomes for our youth.

Key challenges include (1) getting buy-in from those in the community who need these (Continued next column)

and (2) from businesses that can provide paid and unpaid internships or jobs for high internships or jobs for high school students.

The morning began with a presentation from Mission Graduate, a multi-sector education partnership from central NM. Their goal is more than noteworthy: add 60,000 new college degrees and certificates by 2020. Next, students who had attended Mayor Gonzalez' Youth Summit in October addressed the action items they sought from the community.

These included: (1) donations of school supplies, (2)healthier foods in schools, (3) promotion of community gardens, (4) mentors needed, (5) balancing schools and jobs, and (6) jobs.

Breakout sessions followed. Subjects ranged from (1) healthy babies and children, (2) improving school attendance, (3) after school and summer school programs, (4) career pathways and job growth, (5) engaging "lost" youth, and (6)mentoring, tutoring and internships.

I attended the latter and along with Boys and Girls Clubs, Communities in Schools, Adelante, Inspire Santa Fe and others, we decided both an online hub and a physical site were needed to further these opportunities for students and provide matches, - a sort of demand supply grid of students who need mentors, tutors, and internships.

As you can see, many opportunities exist and new ones are opening up for our AAUW members to volunteer.





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New Mexico Legislative Education Study Committee (LESC) Insights

Over the last month I attended three Legislative Education Study Committee (LESC) meetings. It was interesting to observe democracy in action.

The New Mexico STEM Action Team, created in 2012 by the New Mexico Partnership for Mathematics and Science Education and New Mexico First, made a compelling presentation. They established three goals to be achieved by 2020.

- (1) The first was to increase the number of students measurably proficient in English and math by 25%;
- (2) graduate 1,000 new science and math teachers while also supporting and retaining existing STEM teachers;
- (3) increase the number of college graduates in STEM fields including health by 25%.

In addition, they provided 11 more recommendations for the Legislature to consider in support of K-12 STEM education.

I learned in New Mexico, the Legislature and Department of Education determine teacher salaries throughout the State. Most other States in the U.S. use local property taxes to fund education and local school districts determine salaries for their teachers. Salaries for teachers in New Mexico are very low. A beginning teacher last year earned \$32,000.00 and this year pay will increase Only two thousand dollars.

Aside from this raise for new teachers, there has not been a salary increase for other teachers in seven years.

Last school year a pot of money was established to give bonuses to teachers based on performance. Santa Fe Public Schools was one of very few school districts, which applied for these funds, to benefit. There was very little accountability on the distribution of these funds. One special education teacher received \$ 79.00 versus a principal who received \$ 10,000.00.

These low teacher salaries affect teacher shortages, teacher retention, and lack of substitutes among many other factors. This year the money the State is going to receive from oil and gas is projected to be lower. This will impact budgeting for the State. Yet, there was intense discussion on improving salaries for teachers, so there is some hope.

Lastly, I would like to bring to your attention there are approximately 100 Charter Schools in the State, most of which are in Albuquerque. Right now the Charter Schools receive approximately \$1,500.00 more per pupil than do the public schools throughout the State. A number of legislators felt this was unfair and want to change the formula. Time will tell if this happens.

If you have some spare time, attend the next set of meetings in December. They will be held in the State Capitol, Room 307 on December 16 – 18.
