President's Report

From President Lynn Heffron

AAUW Santa Fe is delighted and honored to announce that the estate of the late Philip F. May, husband of member Anne L. May, has bequeathed our branch \$170,000. To date, we have received \$136,000 which is in a specially designated May Fund account at our bank, First Citizens. The balance will be distributed with the final settling of the estate.

Philip May was a longtime supporter of women's rights and gender equality. In 1968 he received his BS in Electrical Engineering from MIT. In the early '70s he earned a Master's in Education from Harvard University. Along with teaching pre-school, and then later serving as the director of a day school for children, he was an astute investor, an avid outdoorsman and a dedicated naturalist. His commitment to conservation resulted in the preservation of hundreds of thousands of acres of rain and dry forest in Central America. Philip's scientific passion was lichenology. He conducted DNA research at the Farlow Herbarium at Harvard University. Late in his career, he was honored by having a species of lichen named after him, *Parmelia mayi*, which can be found in the northern Appalachian mountains.

Whether it was teaching white water kayaking or introducing a novice to lichenology, Philip was attentive to the voices and experiences of women. He actively supported the education of women and girls in scientific disciplines and encouraged women's pursuit of financial competency to ensure economic security. It is with great joy that we celebrate Philip F. May's generous gift to our Santa Fe branch, a man whose leadership will help ensure that educated women can and will lead. The timing couldn't be better.

We are forming a committee to meet, research, and recommend best ways and opportunities to allocate these funds. Our draft plan should be in place by Nov. 16th when AAUW National Board Chair Julia Brown will join us here in Santa Fe to review our findings and make further recommendations.

One caveat, in speaking with AAUW National, it has been determined that we are not allowed to give or donate any funds to a non-profit organization, a 501(c)3. However, we can give money directly to people like scholarship winners. Perhaps local young women graduating from high school could use our help, for instance.

Please email me directly if you would like to join our committee and if not, please share via email any ideas you think the committee should consider.

The Mission of the New Mexico Governor's Mansion Foundation

As a non-partisan, non-profit organization, The Governor's Mansion Foundation keeps the beauty and legacy of the historic Governor's home alive through tours and community outreach.

The Foundation was born in1987 out of then-First Lady Kathy Carruthers' desire to unite the eclectic decorative styles that had evolved in the Governor's Mansion over the years into a more cohesive design representing New Mexico at its best. When her husband, Garrey Carruthers, took office in 1987, one of Mrs. Carruthers' first acts was to order a thorough evaluation of the Mansion's structural soundness.

As major renovations were needed to improve the design and furnishings of the public areas, Mrs. Carruthers called together a bipartisan group of individuals interested in improving the Mansion. From the beginning, it was acknowledged that any redesign would have to be financed with private money. Public monies have never gone into the interior design.

To this day, the New Mexico Governor's Mansion Foundation remains a non-partisan and non-profit organization. The responsibility for the design, furnishings, and upkeep of the public areas of the Mansion rests upon the Foundation, and its dedicated team of volunteers.

SANTA FE CONCERT BAND'S HOLIDAY CONCERT


The Santa Fe Concert Band continues one of Santa Fe's oldest traditions, of free public concerts by volunteer musicians. This tradition dates back to 1865, when Francisco Pérez, after serving as a Confederate Army bugler in the ill-fated invasion of New Mexico by Texas forces during the Civil War, returned to Santa Fe and formed *La Banda de Santa Fe*. This musical tradition continued under various names and directors, including Los Conquistadores from 1909 through 1940, the latter part of which was under the highly-respected and popular Dan McKenzie. The Santa Fe Concert Band was formally incorporated in 1983 under the directorship of **Greg Heltman**.

STEM News



On Saturday October 13th, **STEM Santa Fe**, a non-profit organization started and run by our own Lina Germann, put on a STEM conference for girls 10 to 14-years-old called **Expanding Your Horizons**. The conference was a huge success, very lively, with 165 girls in attendance, 60 volunteers, 20 STEM demonstration exhibitors, and, most importantly, 16 hands-on STEM workshops led by women professionals in STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) fields.

The conference keynote speaker was **<u>National Science Foundation Director Dr. France A. Córdova</u> who came from Washington, DC to speak! Her speech was a big hit. Afterwards, the girls formed a long line asking questions and asking for her autograph.**

While Lina will continue on as an AAUW-Santa Fe member, she is reducing her more active roles on the Board.

Lina has been an AAUW member since October 1, 2000, all in Santa Fe, a total of 18 years with only one year off when she was having her second baby and going to graduate school for her MBA at the same time. She has served on the State and Branch boards in many different positions, including Public Policy Chair, STEM Coordinator/ Chair for 9 years, Newsletter Editor briefly, and Co-President. Lina created, designed, and maintained the Santa Fe branch website 15 years ago; it was the first AAUW website in New Mexico for any AAUW group, including the State AAUW organization.

Thank you, Lina, for your dedication to AAUW-Santa Fe and all of your time on the Board. The organization will miss your energy, attention to detail, focus on STEM activities, and passionate positive outlook. STEM Santa Fe will clearly benefit by your time, but the AAUW Board will truly miss you.
