### <u>President's Report</u>

The Santa Fe branch has recently been very active in several ways. Two major committees have been formed: the Equal Pay Day Committee and the May Fund Committee.

For Equal Pay Day, Santa Fe Mayor Alan Webber has endorsed our Equal Pay Day Dinner to be held here in Santa Fe on April 2, 2019. He will be a guest speaker and his office will support us with their advertising as well. We are hoping to have him joined by our new Governor Lujan-Grisham and have invited Julia Brown to represent AAUW National. This will be our first fundraising event to call attention to our branch's focus on providing scholarships to local Santa Fe graduating seniors and to women who want to return to college, along with holding one or more Start Smart/Work Smart workshops open to all women of Santa Fe. We see education as the key to helping women and girls advance in the workplace, demand equal pay, and seek leadership roles. This committee has met several times as we gather member volunteer support for the many functions that accompany this undertaking.

As we are currently a 501©4 only, we are applying to the New Mexico Community Foundation for their fiscal agency support. Thanks go out to Mary Jensen for her leadership towards this goal and to Lindsay Conover for her help with our Mayor.

The May Fund Committee, with 11 participating members, continues to meet as well to investigate the many ways our branch can best utilize the

funds left to us by the late Philip May, husband of member Anne May. Our board has approved this committee's recommendation to allocate these funds for educational purposes to include the scholarships and workshops mentioned above.

At the Equal Pay Day Dinner, we will seek matching funds in order to increase the value of the May Fund. In order to comply with AAUW National's policies, President Lynn Heffron recently spoke with Julia Brown who clarified ways we can invest and allocate funds going forward. Thanks to Jeanne Patrick for her committee leadership.

At the request of the very active women at AAUW SF member St. John's College, we have organized a presentation on sexual harassment on campuses. Carol Neal, Co-facilitator at the Los Alamos branch, recommended their recent guest speaker, Kristi Nadler, who will address this issue. Two other women experts will join her. This event is will be held on January 23rd on the St. John's campus starting at 6:30. All members are welcomed to attend. Louise Yakey and Lynn Heffron continue working with the amazing young women at St. John's.

Our November program featured lunch followed by a guided tour of the Governor's Mansion. These were well attended and generated much interest and we added new members as a result. Thanks to Luanne Moyer, for her leadership that day.

I am happy to also report that our UNM Foundation Endowment has continued to grow thus providing our yearly scholarship to a graduate UNM student from Santa Fe. The May Fund will complement this with additional funding given directly to the student. Hooray to Mickey Bond, our wonderful financial lead on this.

Once again, we are entering the New Mexico State legislative cycle, preparing for the two-month Legislative Session that will run from January 15 to March 16, 2019. During this two-month session, the focus will not only be upon the budget, but also will be jam-packed with many other matters for possible legislative action. Of particular interest to AAUW this session are:

#### **2019 New Mexico Legislative Dates**

December 17, 2018 - January 11, 2019 Legislation may be pre-filed

January 15 Opening day (noon)

31 February 14 Deadline for introduction of new bills

16 Session ends (noon)

April 5 Legislation not acted upon by governor is pocket vetoed

June 14 Effective date of legislation not a general appropriation bill or a bill carrying

an emergency clause or other specified date

**Roe v. Wade** is a landmark 1973 Supreme Court decision that established a woman's legal right to an abortion. The Court ruled, in a 7-2 decision, that a woman's right to choose an abortion was protected by the privacy rights guaranteed by the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. That decision has been under attack ever since.

There is nothing permanent or unassailable about a human right. Rights exist only to the extent that the protected class is willing to defend and protect those rights. New Mexico is one of only nine states to still have a 50-year-old law on its books banning abortion in almost all cases. The only thing keeping this option open for women in New Mexico, keeping women who choose abortion from being charged with a *felony*, is the 1973 Supreme Court decision in Roe v. Wade legalizing abortion nationwide.

On January 22, 2019, stand up and be counted among those who defend and protect a woman's right to determine her own reproductive health. Be counted <u>not</u> as a politician, <u>not</u> as a member of a religious or any other organization, <u>not</u> as a pharmacist or by any other profession. Be counted as just the woman you are. As it should be.

Dr. Goldblatt has worked in the counseling and medical social work field for many years, with a specialty in providing behavioral health programs, grant coordination and counseling in the prevention of interpersonal and sexual abuse violence.
- 3) **Christie Knight, Ph.D.**, Training and Development Specialist of the OVW Violence Against Women Grant/UNM-LA Sexual Violence Prevention Program. She has worked for many years in sexual violence prevention and response. Dr. Knight specializes in teaching student bystander intervention.

#### The Cathedral posts this history on its website:

The City of Santa Fe was founded in 1610. That same year the first church was built on this site. The original adobe church was replaced in 1630 by a larger one, which was destroyed by the Pueblo Indian Revolt of 1680.

The expelled Spaniards returned in 1693 but were not able to rebuild the church until 1714. This new church was named in honor of Saint Francis of Assisi, the Patron Saint of Santa Fe.

The only part of this church still existing is the small adobe chapel dedicated to Our Lady La Conquistadora. Brought from Spain in 1625, the statue is the oldest representation of the Virgin Mary in the United States.

In 1850, Santa Fe received its first Bishop, Father John Baptiste Lamy of France. Judging the 1714 old adobe church as inadequate for the seat of the Archdiocese, Bishop Lamy ordered a new Romanesque church built, and brought French architects and Italian stonemasons to build his Cathedral.

Construction of the Cathedral began in 1869 and continued until 1887. The new Cathedral was built around the former adobe church and, when the new walls were complete, the old church was torn down and removed through the front door...

Dedicated in 1887, the Cathedral's spires were never completed due to lack of funds. During the most recent structural renewal in 1967, the Cathedral was strengthened, new sacristies were added, and a Blessed Sacrament Chapel was built. In 1987, to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the dedication of the stone church, a monumental altar screen depicting famous saints of North and South America was installed.

The Cathedral was elevated to a Basilica by Pope Benedict XVI in 2005. Basilica means a church of particular importance in Rome and abroad. Churches are honored by the Holy Father because of their importance in the history of spreading Catholicism.
